THE MAKING OF A CHAMPION -

The Special Olympics World Games bring together people with and without disabilities from all over the world to unite around a common goal of sports and comradery. This year, the Special Olympic World Games were held in Berlin, Germany from June 17th – 25th. This event hosted more than 7,000 Special Olympic athletes and unified partners from approximately 190 countries to compete in 26 sports.

Eggleston is proud to announce our very own Trasean Singletary represented the United States in three track events: the 4x400 meter relay, the 5000 meters where he won BRONZE with a time of 21:31.68, and the 3000 meters where he won GOLD with a time of 12:18.10.

Before he left for Germany, Trasean talked about his love for running. He said he started running as a teenager as a way to burn calories and stay fit and healthy for his friends and family. Trasean shared how his mom's support and encouragement "to never give up" have been a big motivator for him. He trains seven days a week and runs everywhere including to and from work at Eggleston, which is a 4.7-mile trip each way. When asked what it is about running that you love Trasean said "You have to keep moving forward, put the past and negative stuff behind you. Running helps me keep moving forward."

In addition to being an amazing runner, Trasean has also been a valued member of our Norfolk Laundry staff for more than 10 years. He brings the same level of hard work and determination to his job as he does to his running, and it shows. "Trasean is a great worker. He is hardworking, reliable, productive, and knowledgeable on all of the different jobs within the laundry." shared Bob Anders, Norfolk Production Manager.

FEDERAL AND COMMERCIAL PROGRAMS



Eggleston proudly supports five branches of our U.S. Military. For decades, we have worked with the Federal Government as well as local and regional businesses to provide contract services to the region and employ hundreds of people, including many veterans and their family members.

FOOD SERVICE

Our food service teams are proud to employ 86 individuals who strive to provide excellent service to both the Navy and Marines at more than eight locations across Hampton Roads.

Over the past year Naval Medical Center Portsmouth (NMCP) received a larger contract including Eggleston employees now running two departments that were previously managed by the military. We are also in charge of the Diet Office and Special Diet Chef (SDC). Additionally, all patient care food service is overseen by the Eggleston staff.



Both the Norfolk Naval Station Galley and Oceana Galley received a 5 Star Accreditation Assessment for the second year

in a row. This Navy inspection is where galleys compete to be the best in the Navy based on providing excellent service, management, sanitation, customer satisfaction, and more. The employees display great work ethics and follow all policies and procedures to maintain this level of excellence in service and quality.

INDUSTRIAL LAUNDRY





Eggleston Commercial Laundry division serves five branches of the military as well as other Federal and Corporate clients at our Norfolk and Portsmouth facilities. This division and its 98 employees have a strong partnership with SourceAmerica under the AbilityOne Program. In addition, the team provided laundry services to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) ship Gordon Gunter (homeported in Pascagoula, Mississippi) who stopped in Norfolk to load on supplies before heading off into the Atlantic Ocean to measure water currents and temperatures.

The Portsmouth facility received a new cart wash unit from the Portsmouth Community Block Development Grant. This allows the team to wash and sanitize the carts more efficiently between deliveries.

MAILROOM AND CUSTODIAL SERVICES



Eggleston provides mailroom services for the Mid-Atlantic Office of the Army Corps of Engineers and executes custodial services for the Navy SEAL Teams stationed at the Joint Expeditionary Base Little Creek-Fort Story. These unique opportunities provide jobs for 14 individuals (3 mailroom and 11 custodial) in our community.

MEET MILTON!

Milton joined Eggleston in 1993 and currently provides mailroom services at the Mid-Atlantic Office of the Army Corps of Engineers. His hard working and dependable nature have made him an asset to the team: no matter the weather. Milton is there. If a co-worker needs help, you can count on Milton! His positive and friendly attitude shines through with every customer he interacts with, which is one of the many reasons his customers love him. Unsurprisingly, his favorite part of the job is delivering mail and packages throughout the facility.

Milton also enjoys participating in the many events, cookouts and celebrations on the base. When he is not at work Milton loves listening to music and learning about new places. His inquisitive nature and eagerness to learn have made him a key member of the mailroom team.



BUSINESS SERVICES

DOCUMENT SHREDDING & CONVERSION



Eggleston offers secure, state-of-the-art document shredding services with a range of options to accommodate all our customers' unique needs including convenient drop-off, routine pick-ups, and purging/bulk jobs. Programs like this not only support local businesses and municipalities by providing a necessary service, they also create employment opportunities for adults with disabilities.

This year, the department and its 10 employees not only maintained and grew the regular route customers, they also added 130 new contracts including the Casey Automotive Family. In addition, the team supported a variety of customers with 122 large purge jobs which included picking up tens of thousands of pounds of paper from multiple locations. The team also upgraded their shredding software which will allow for better optimization of the routes and more effective scheduling.

The Eggleston Garden Center is a retail outlet that has everything you need for your lawn and garden. This team of 11 employees serves many types of customers from master gardeners, active military, local landscapers, first time plant owners, and of

course a strong following of everyday customers. In 2022, Eggleston opened its year-round, indoor Farmers Market which sells a variety of locally sourced seasonal produce and products including peanuts, honey, lotions, spices, popcorn, spirits, and more.

Over the past year the Garden Center expanded its selection of tools, home décor, and patio furniture. The Farmers Market also saw growth, offering a wider range of products as well as selling bread and cookies from the Sugar Plum Bakery and cards from the Ability Center. The market also plans to start offering dairy products, cheeses, and some meat selections in the next year.

LANDSCAPING

Eggleston's landscaping crew offers full service commercial landscaping services and select residential services. We focus mainly on Norfolk and the surrounding cities, but are planning to expand onto the Peninsula in the next year. Over the past year, we added several new commercial clients providing expansion opportunities for our employees.

BUSINESS SERVICES

EGGLESTON AUTO CENTER

Since 1999 Eggleston has run a vehicle donation program to create additional employment opportunities and support other Eggleston programs. Every month the dedicated team at Eggleston's Automotive Center (EAC) repair and detail donated vehicles for auction. This year, despite a decline in auto donations, the auctions continue to be an important revenue source for the organization. The Group Supported Employment program, in the face of declining donations, decided to diversify work opportunities by supporting Document Services, painting, and performing building and grounds maintenance. They also participated in HRT's Adopt-A-Stop program.

The EAC not only oversees the Eggleston corporate fleet they have also started providing fleet maintenance services for additional corporate clients. The retail automotive repair services have also grown this year.

BUSINESS FULFILLMENT & CUSTOM ASSEMBLY

For more than 65 years, Eggleston has helped Hampton Roads businesses succeed by meeting their requirements for quality services at competitive prices with a capable and motivated workforce that is ready to work. Our business fulfillment teams offer a variety of services including various assembly, kitting, packaging, inspection, testing, cleaning, bagging, labeling, repackaging of bulk materials into ready-to-issue quantities, support for local promotions, and bulk mailing services.

Eggleston is proud to support 70% of Cox Communications customers through Cox's Accessory Recovery Program by cleaning, refurbishing, and repairing remotes as well as sorting and rewrapping cables. The team also saw a 40% increase in the workload for Ryson International and their vertical conveying solutions. Due to the outstanding work of the Eggleston team, both of these partnerships have seen a tremendous increase in production demands and expectations over the past year, providing new and expanded career and work opportunities for the individuals in this program. The team has also been working with other local businesses to support them on both seasonal and long term projects.

TRIBUTE TO PAUL

Thank you, Paul Atkinson, Sr. for your **35 years of dedicated service** and steadfast leadership! From your time in college at Virginia Commonwealth University you have been determined to make a positive impact on the world. You have done just that!

Paul worked at the Richmond Cerebral Palsy Center to put himself through college as a special education teacher's aide. There he met Thomas, an incredibly smart young man with cerebral palsy. Even with Thomas's intellect, he believed he would be a burden on his family because he was not able to work in the family business. Paul knew that Thomas had more to give; people with disabilities should have the same opportunity to work within their community. Not only does working provide stability and routine, it allows others to make a meaningful contribution to the world around them. Paul believed Thomas, and others with disabilities needed to be afforded these opportunities, so when he worked at Petersburg state institution, he earned his graduate degree.

Not only has Paul's legacy been as a servant leader who deeply cares for Eggleston's mission and staff, his legacy has been of humility and kindness. Even as he retires after 35 years with the organization, he does not want to be celebrated or honored in any way. Like a truly selfless leader, he would rather organizational resources go toward the individuals Eggleston serves. Paul is constantly boasting and promoting Eggleston's outreach and success. He has promoted Eggleston across the country for over 20 years through his involvement and leadership roles with SourceAmerica, and his impact has been tremendous for individuals with disabilities. Examples of his service include being the Chair of SourceAmerica for many years, the appointment by multiple Governors to serve on and lead State Boards, Commissions and being the recipient of the Milton J. Cohen Leadership Award to name a few. Paul is a former president of vaACCSES, a state trade association for community rehabilitation programs, and former president of the National Council of Work Centers.

Paul often asks his team members why do we do all of this? Really, we do it to create jobs for people that have barriers to a point. When Paul was named Eggleston's executive director in 1991 the organization had an annual revenue budget of less than \$500,000 and served 125 people with disabilities. Today, the organization provides employment or services to over 1700 individuals with an annual revenue budget of over \$30 million dollars of which 70% is allocated to wages and benefits to Eggleston employees with a priority of hiring individuals with disabilities.

In every public audience, Paul used to say that Eggleston does laundry for every branch of the service; however, since the inception of the Space Force, we need to obtain a contract with the Space Force before he can say that again. Thanks to Paul's leadership, there are many more things to celebrate about Eggleston. Within Eggleston, there are three divisions including Eggleston's rehabilitation and recreation programs, commercial and retail; and industrial programs.

Paul's compassion towards others is felt by each team member and client he interacts with. In a recent speech he gave at the Recovery4Life Gala in Virginia Beach, he mentioned how important kindness is. "Never underestimate your kind words on another person. You don't know what your words will do to another person. The other is to be nice, you don't know what struggles or what people have to overcome to show up and be present on a daily basis." Thanks to Paul, everyone at Eggleston strives to be kind, considerate, and compassionate to each person they meet.

Paul has made profound contributions to humanity through Eggleston. "The company has not only grown exponentially under his leadership, but its mark in the region, and I would daresay nationally, has grown by leaps and bounds. When Paul came to the organization, people asked "What is Eggleston?" Now when I tell people that I am on the board, they remark, 'You're on the board of Eggleston!', states Phil Russo, Eggleston Board member. Your Eggleston family will truly miss you, Paul. You are an incredible part of the Eggleston team and many of us strive to be the leader you are. We will miss your kindness, wit, intellect, dedication, and leadership. Even though we all will miss you deeply, we wish you the best in your retirement. Thank you for your service and dedication to Eggleston over the past 35 years!

VOCATIONAL REHAB SERVICES

COMMUNITY EMPLOYMENT

Eggleston's staff of experienced Employment Specialists provide one-on-one job coaching services to help individuals reach their goal of obtaining employment in the community. They also help local employers find and hire these hard-working and dependable employees.

Despite some internal staffing challenges, the community employment team continued to increase billable service hours and keep staff performance high, resulting in an increase in service hours performed.

In the upcoming year, the program has plans to increase staffing to expand the program and provide employment support across all the vocational rehab programs. The staff will be empowered with the technology, infrastructure, and other tools necessary to do their best work every day.

COLLABORATIVE COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS

The Collaborative Community Connections (C3) program was started in Portsmouth in 2017 and is dedicated to ensuring that vulnerable populations, specifically homeless individuals, and those at imminent risk of homelessness, have the opportunity for viable employment. In late 2020, Eggleston expanded its C3 program to include Norfolk to support the increased need for services to ensure individuals have the opportunity for employment throughout Hampton Roads and expand our relationships with community partners.



Many of these individuals have a disability or other barriers to employment. This program provides employment readiness support such as building resumes, job searches, setting up interviews, and mock job interviews. They also work to develop relationships with local businesses to establish opportunities that recognize each individual's situation and foster employment. In the new fiscal year, the C3 program is hoping to secure additional funding to expand the service areas and increase the number of individuals served and placed in employment.

VOCATIONAL REHAB SERVICES

BRAIN INJURY SERVICES/BEACON HOUSE



Eggleston's Brain Injury Services consist of **Beacon House, Case Management, and Support Groups.**

Beacon House serves as a clubhouse model

for adults with an Acquired Brain Injury (ABI). The Clubhouse focuses on abilities rather than disabilities, and capitalizes on these abilities for the combined good of all Members. Members are recognized for their contribution and work together to support each other in the pursuit of personal goals. This rehabilitative environment provides opportunities for friendships, important work, employment, education, and to access the services and supports they may individually need. For years members of Beacon House have been speaking with high school students about making smart choices while driving and brain injury prevention. During the pandemic they had to move these presentations to virtual but last year they were able to return in person, facilitating 28 presentations. The members hope to increase the number of presentations during the 2023-24 school year.

Our case manager provides guidance, education, and empowerment by linking individuals with community resources, setting up services, and acting as a liaison with other providers. Anyone in the community with an ABI can work with our case manager, not just Beacon House members.

Living with a brain injury can be lonely. It helps to know you are not alone. Eggleston offers support to both survivors and caregivers, family, and friends.

A C3 SUCCESS STORY:

While at a local resource center, Mary Clark, an Eggleston job coach, came upon a flier for The Marine Trade Training program. This program offers courses in welding, pipefitting, sheet metal, structural fitting, and coatings at no cost to eligible individuals. Mary took all the information and reached out to one of her clients, Bernard, because she knew he had previous experience as a welder and wanted to see if he was interested in this program.

Mary reviewed the information with Bernard, and he decided he would like to apply for the welding courses. Bernard and Mary attended the virtual information session, which provided program details and requirements. Bernard then attended an in-person intake session to complete the paperwork and began the steps to enrollment. As his job coach, Mary provided support by giving Bernard bus passes to attend the intake session and pre-enrollment requirements.

Once Bernard completed enrollment, the next step was to wait for the course start date. Bernard received the course start date and started Welding Course I on June 6th and Welding Course II on July 10th. Congratulations Bernard!



WARRIOR BRIDGE

The Hampton Roads community has one of the largest populations of veterans and transitioning military in the country. The Warrior Bridge program continues to grow, assisting veterans with disabilities by connecting them to vital resources, services, benefit counseling, and employment assistance. This program uses a person-centered approach to promote self- sufficiency and is in the unique position to provide immediate employment to veterans through Eggleston's multiple businesses.



Warrior Bridge continues to seek opportunities to expand services to include more federal employment through the Ability One program.

In May of 2023, Eggleston veterans and employees partnered with Bank of America to participate in the annual Carry The Load event. Carry The Load is a nationwide relay event during the month of May that provides an active way to connect Americans to the sacrifices made daily by our military, veterans, and their families.

RESIDENTIAL SERVICES

Eggleston provides residential community-based living options for individuals who have a primary diagnosis of intellectual disabilities. Eggleston residential services are person-centered, incorporating the individuals' dreams, wishes and talents. The individuals supported have many opportunities to be active members in the community, creating natural supports, and lasting friendships.

This year brought about a lot of changes with the purchasing and openings of three new residential homes (Fairmont, Louisiana, and Stanford) and the transition out of three homes that were previously rented from the Sarah Bonwell Hudgins Foundation. With that transition, Eggleston welcomed two new house managers and broadened their community connections.

Individuals celebrated success with new opportunities for community employment, participation and accolades won at the annual OK5K, participation in Eggleston's Inclusion & Independence Cookout, as well as continued personal growth achieving their goals.

Looking to the future, Eggleston is excited about expanding the continuum of services, and looking for more opportunities for community housing for single home individuals. Finally, the staff and

> individuals are excited about any forthcoming opportunities to speak to those in legislation about what it is Eggleston does, in an attempt to increase funding opportunities and awareness.

DAY SUPPORT SERVICES

Eggleston offers five distinct center-based day support service locations across Hampton Roads. Service sites are located in Norfolk, Chesapeake, and Newport News. Group Day Services are designed to offer individuals meaningful activities throughout the year. These services are based on a person-centered philosophy and support personal perspectives, beliefs, and preferences. All activities provided focus on building relationships, personal growth, and independence. Group day services provide opportunities for friendships, community integration, enhancement of social networks, and assurance of an individual's health and safety.

Eggleston continues to expand its Community Engagement program where small groups spend the majority of their day participating in a variety of activities in the community, as opposed to the typical center-based model. These opportunities increase meaningful community connections, and develop natural supports by focusing on task learning, socialization, communication, positive behavior development, personal care, and environmental awareness.

This past year the Chesapeake location transitioned its services to exclusively Community Engagement which is a 3 to 1 ratio. In the new FY Eggleston plans to relocate their Chesapeake location to a new facility that would allow individuals to be closer to community events and offer both center-based day support and community engagement out of the same location.




2022-2023 Percent of Revenue Total by Service Unit
